## PREFACE

In 1994, the United Nations General Assembly declared 1995-2004 the United Nations Decade for Human Rights Education (UNDHRE). The following year, ARRC produced the *ARRC Resource Collection on Human Rights Education* volume one.

Since 1995, human rights education has grown significantly in the Asia-Pacific region. ARRC has been in a position to monitor this growth through the process of compiling information that was included in *A Directory of Asia and the Pacific Organizations Related to Human Rights Education Work* (1999) and more recently, the *ARRC Resource Material Collection on Human Rights Education* volume two (2000). There appears to be growth in the number of organizations involved in human rights education work and producing materials.

ARRC believes that human rights education is crucial for making people aware of their rights and mobilizing them to struggle for the protection and realization of these rights. Exchanging human rights education materials through catalogues such as this one further enhances human rights education and hopefully peoples desire to promote, protect and realize their rights. The aim of the collection is to share the vast wealth of ideas and experiences in human rights education and related concerns with human rights educators throughout the region. ARRC hopes that this process of sharing will improve the quality of human rights education and the number of people involved in building a culture of human rights in the future.

ARRC's Resource Materials Collection on Human Rights Education volume two provides brief descriptions of human rights education materials and the contact details of the organizations producing them. The collection features practical teaching manuals, country reports, conference proceedings, journals and newsletters, directories and catalogues, and other useful resources.

We hope you find this catalogue a useful tool in your search for human rights education materials.

## Introduction

**Teaching manuals** are practical guides for teachers, trainers, facilitators and community development workers. Teaching manuals are designed to help put human rights education into *action*.

These materials have been divided into sub-categories to help guide your search.

- Formal teaching materials are designed for use by teachers and students in schools. These materials may be integrated into pre-existing school curriculums or used as part of extra-curricular activities.
- Non-formal teaching materials are for use by trainers, facilitators, activists
  and community development workers in non-formal education settings. The
  target group for these materials includes marginalized groups, community
  groups, NGOs and the general public.
- General learning materials may be used in a variety of contexts in either formal or non-formal educational settings. Teaching materials designed to be used with government officials, law enforcers and journalists feature in this section. Illustrated texts and picture books form the bulk of this chapter.

Country reports provide in depth description and analysis of the human rights situation in twenty countries in the Asia region. Given the quantity of country reports being produced at any one time, these reports have been divided into the following sub-regions: South Asia, Southeast Asia and Northeast Asia. Country reports cover racial, religious and gender discrimination, domestic violence, trafficking in women and children, migrant labour, child labour, bonded labour, internally displaced people and refugees, the impact of censorship laws and alternative education systems.

Conference proceedings include reports of seminars, workshops and training sessions related to human rights education or human rights held in the region in the last five years. Conference proceedings that include a sizable number of training materials have been incorporated into the section on teaching manuals.

**Journals and newsletters** refer to regularly published materials that provide brief updates on activities and issues of concern related to human rights and human rights education in the Asia-Pacific region.

**Directories and catalogues** refer to dense collections of information that will help you find more resources on human rights and human rights education. In addition to catalogues and directories this section includes annotated bibliographies and human rights film festival guides.

Other useful resources include reference materials for human rights education and international human rights instruments, such as conventions, covenants and declarations. Illustrated versions of important human rights documents may be found with the general learning materials.

Please refer to volume one of the *ARRC Resource Material Collection on Human Rights Education* for information on human rights education materials produced between 1990-1995.



It covers a) exploring the human rights environment in the school, b) how to introduce human rights into the school curriculum, c) useful teaching methodology, d) how to design your own HRE activities and evaluate them. Parts 3 and 4 contain activities for younger children and older

children respectively on the following topics; responsibility. the universality of human rights. what to do when rights conflict and taking human rights beyond the classroom. Each of these lessons contain aims. objectives, time frames, materials used, how to conduct the lesson and questions you may want to explore with your target audience. Part 5 focuses on human rights documents, namely the UDHR and the CRC. Part 6 suggests ways in which these activities and experiences can be taken further.
